“ It takes a very special kind of man to live in a house full of women. Our dad grew up 1 of 10 siblings in a small home where he and 2 of his brothers slept in an unheated attic. The bathroom was an outhouse at the corner of the driveway. The first time he saw the ocean he was 15, and 2 years later he joined the Navy. Upon his return he was pursued by a cute local girl named Margaret and they married in 1950.



He got a job as a laborer in Mack Trucks. Then came the girls, a nonstop stream of them. He welcomed moms sisters Florence and Mary, followed by 5 daughters of his own into his home. It was loud, very loud. When the noise level became too much, he would retreat to his station wagon parked on the street in front of our house and listen to a ball game on the radio. Our dad got a lot of use from his many station wagons through the years. I still believe that our love of the beauty of nature was acquired because our dad would take us for a ride in the mountains above route 22 when a conflict arose, but by the time we returned we couldn't remember why we were arguing in the first place.

Our dad was a man of few words. He didn't speak much, thankfully so, as an open telephone line was extremely scarce; but when he did speak he always had something heartfelt and meaningful to say. He instilled a work ethic in us, for even though it was hard work, each daughter wanted to be the one chosen to load and unload the paint buckets and ladders, sand woodwork and wash brushes, for to be chosen as the painters assistant for the day was an honor and a privilege.

There was always time for a comforting hug, especially for Jackie... for she was the baby, a namesake for dad and the last in a line of girls for trying for a son wasn't to be.

The house on Evans Drive welcomed so much life and love , and always had room for one more. A wave from dads hand in the window that somehow said more than goodbye meant that you were free to drive away from one of the many special moments there. It will be hard to live in this world without him as he was such a meaningful part of our family's life. We miss him so much already

but we know his heart beats in ours.
